New Mexico's Aging Population



Growing Need in NM

- By 2030, New Mexico will move from 29th highest ranking to the 4th highest in the nation for total senior population per capita¹
- Most older adults wish to "age-inplace" by living in their community longer, necessitating a rebalance of longterm services and supports (LTSS) to include more funding for home-and community-based supports.



Problems Facing Today's Seniors

- 9% of New Mexico seniors have an annual income of less than \$10k
- Isolation is on the rise as families are not coming back home to rural NM (27% are living alone)
- In 2021, 10% of NM adults aged 60 years or older self-reported they have difficulty living independently; for example, doing errands alone such as visiting a doctor's office or shopping.



Quality Assurance & Services Needed

- US data shows new trends for senior centers:
 - A *decrease* in transportation activities; in 2020 there were 48, 692 clients served and in 2021 this decreased to 43,949 clients.
 - An *increase* in case management activities; in 2020, there were 487,523 clients served for case management, and in 2021, this increase to 515,114 clients.





State of New Mexico's Senior Centers

New Mexico Senior Centers

Today's senior centers need to accommodate a large age range from mid 60's to late 90's

- 46% are local government owned
 & administered
- 28% are tribal government owned & administered
- 23% are nonprofit owned & administered
- 3% are meal sites only, not senior centers

Capacity & Sense of Urgency

- Current senior center capacity can only serve 4% (20,428) of New Mexico's 60+ (532,186) population
- If we do not increase our senior centers' capacities now, New Mexico will only be able to serve 3% by 2030.

National Rankings

- New Mexico represents 3% of the total 300 nationally accredited senior centers. (National Institute of Senior Centers).
- Since 2019, 9 New Mexico senior centers have been accredited. (8 centers in Albuquerque, 1 in Las Cruces.)

Direct Care Services provided by Aging Network Centers

Service Mix

- 76% Transportation
- 15% Respite
- 5% Case Management

New Mexico Grown



- Total Amount of FY24 Allocation \$825,600 (38% increase)
- Total Number of Providers 26 (18% increase)
- Total Number of Senior Centers that will be receiving NM Grown Food Items – 75 (10% increase)

- NMSO will receive separate funding for four special events.
- Total Number of Tribal Senior Centers that applied for NMG FY24 4
- Total Number of Tribal Senior Centers 21 which includes the 4 that responded to the RFA.









Aging Network Expansion





- Collaborate with AAAs and providers to expand services
- AAA \$2M increase to accommodate for \$15 hour positions and inflation for the cost of goods
- AAA \$2M Home Based Services i.e. homemaker, caregiver, respite, chore
- 4 Additional FTE regional technical assistance and workforce development




Adult Protective Services (APS)

Expanding services, supports, & assistance to prevent abuse, neglect and exploitation



Esperanza Lucero, APS Director received the President's Award from the National Adult Protective Services Association (NAPSA) for prevention, intervention, harm reduction model implementation.

- Annual staff turnover rate of 1%.
- 627 Referrals made to outside agencies & resources
- 484 Food boxes delivered to vulnerable adults
- 410 Outreach presentations for FY23
- 33 Guardianships and 2 Grievances filed
- 52 Seniors in APS Social Work Intern Pen Pal Program (NMHU & NMSU) to combat loneliness and isolation.



New MexiCare Pilot Program

Problem:

- In 2021, 20% of NM adults reported they provide regular care or assistance to a friend / family member with a health problem or disability.*
- 9/10 adults 65+ want to stay at home as long as possible.**

Solution:

- Among the 6 counties included in pilot, at least 11,000 older adults are ineligible for Medicaid & therefore could benefit from New MexiCare***
- Home care fills gaps in and reduces strain on the health care services system. New MexiCARE will save NM at least \$33 million annually that would otherwise be spent on care provided by long-term facilities.****

Goals:

- Increase quality of life for caregivers and their loved ones
- Reduce hospital visits (and hospital acquired infections)
- Reduce LTC facility placements

Program Performance:

Will be continually assessed using data collected from:

- emergency dept. visits
- hospitalizations
- long term care facility placement
- caregiver/client satisfaction surveys

New MexiCare Pilot Program

- Financial assistance and training to caregivers who are assisting friends or family members with daily activities due to physical and/or cognitive limitations
- Who qualifies?
 - 60+
 - Assistance with 2+ ADL's
 - Not eligible for Medicaid
 - Max Income: \$3,300/\$6,600 Individual/Couple
 - Max Assets: \$19,800/\$39,600 Individual/Couple
- Eligible for up to \$15,000 in benefits per year
- Expecting to serve 350+ people this FY in the 6 counties

Ombudsman Program

Overview

The program has established a goal of monthly visits to each long-term care (LTC) facility, outperforming 59% of LTCOP programs nationwide as it relates to nursing facility (NF) visitation and 83% as it relates to assisted living facility (ALF) visitation.

Action Plan

- Tactic 1: Modernize LTCOP Organizational Structure
- Tactic 2: Volunteer Management -Recruitment & Retention
- Tactic 3: Build Volunteer Pipeline
- Tactic 4: Build Awareness and Inspire Quality
- Tactic 5: Fund the Program at the Appropriate Level

Goals

- One volunteer for each LTC facility (~ 300)
- Match the unique skills, interests and abilities of LTCOP volunteers
- Build an on-demand training and resource guide for Ombudsman
- Proactive community engagement (residents, families, and communities) and promotion of LTCOP and benefits of volunteerism

Senior Services & Center Improvement

- Create an Office of Senior Center Quality of Assurance for senior center improvements and expansion of services; linking AND + OIEA to share best practices and resources.
- Move 4 FTE from Program Support (P591) to Aging Network Division (P594) General Fund \$374,800 to align programmatic needs with senior center facilities' capabilities and service needs.
- Move AAA Funding from Aging Network Division (P594) to Area Agencies on Aging (P595), General Fund-\$24,867,300 & Federal Fund- \$11,142,500. AAA funding model is a federal mandate.
